

TRANSPORTATION

Acquisition of the Tillamook to Hillsboro spur rail line offers this county opportunities few coastal communities have. With the airport and a potential seaport at Garibaldi, we have transportation facilities to meet future needs.

Easy access to a railroad system encouraged WTD and Diamond Wood Products to build mills in Tillamook County.

The excursion train has runs to Wheeler and to the POTB Industrial Park. A dinner train will be tested this year.

Other rail-related potentials include: promotion packages that tie fishing charters to rail excursions, export of dairy products and import of hay and grain as well as some relief of traffic pressure on highways.

THE MEAD STUDY

(Methane Energy and Agricultural Development).

The MEAD Study, coordinated by the Tillamook County SWCD and conducted by Oregon State University, is assessing the feasibility of environmentally sound growth and diversification of the dairy industry.

Potential exists for using dairy manure, municipal sludge and industrial sludge as raw materials for a methane plant.

Possible new industries include a power plant which converts methane to electrical energy, and meat packing, rendering and feed and fertilizer plants.

DRUG FREE WORKPLACE/SCHOOL POLICY

FIRST DRAFT

Tillamook Bay Community College Service District (District) recognizes controlled substance use as illegal and interfering with effective teaching, work, and the development of a safe and healthy environment for learning. The District has a fundamental legal and ethical obligation to prevent controlled substance use and to maintain an alcohol/drug-free work and educational environment.

Definitions

These policies apply to all members of the College Community (students, faculty, staff) while they are on District property or engaged in any District-sponsored or District-approved activity, event, or function.

"DRUGS" shall include any illegal drug, hallucinogenic drug, prescription drug (in the possession of an individual without a valid prescription), narcotic drug, amphetamine, barbiturate, marijuana, or any other controlled substance (as the same is defined in ORS 475.005 or Schedules I through V under the Federal Controlled Substances Act, 21 USC 811 and 812).

"ALCOHOL" shall include any form of alcohol for consumption, including beer, wine, wine coolers, or distilled liquor.

District Policy

The manufacture, distribution, dispensation, possession, or use of alcohol or drugs, not medically authorized, is strictly prohibited by TBCC.

District Awareness Program

The District shall provide notice at least annually through inservice or otherwise of the following:

1. The dangers of alcohol/drug abuse in the workplace/school,
2. The District's policy of maintaining an alcohol/drug-free workplace/school,
3. Information on appropriate, available alcohol/drug counseling or assistance programs, and
4. Notice of the penalties that may be imposed upon employees/students for alcohol or drug abuse violations in the workplace/school.

District Action

Any student or employee of the District found on District property or at District sponsored

events to be abusing alcohol or using, possession, manufacturing, or distributing controlled substances or alcohol in violation of the law shall be subject to disciplinary action in accordance with applicable policies of the State of Oregon and TBCC. Such disciplinary action includes, but is not necessarily limited to, expulsion, termination of employment, referral for prosecution and/or the completion, at the individual's expense, of an appropriate substance abuse assistance or rehabilitation program.

All employees will notify the District of any criminal drug statue conviction for a violation occurring in buildings, facilities, grounds, or property controlled by the District within five (5) days after such a conviction. The District will, in turn, notify the applicable federal agency of the conviction. Appropriate action will be taken within thirty (30) days of the District's notice of a conviction or violation of the District's policy on a drug-free workplace.

Good Faith Effort

The District shall make a good faith effort to maintain an alcohol/drug-free workplace through implementation of this policy.

UNIVERSITY OF PORTLAND

POLICY REGARDING DRUG-FREE SCHOOLS AND COMMUNITIES ACT

The Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act Amendments of 1989 (Public Law 101-226) requires that the University of Portland must certify to the Secretary of Education that we have "adopted and implemented a program to prevent the use of illicit drugs and the abuse of alcohol by students and employees..." This law, like others the federal government has passed in the last two decades, is tied to eligibility for federal financial assistance.

In developing the policy statements that follow, the university administration has strived to balance the ideals of the University with the reality of human behavior, applicable state and federal laws, and civil liabilities. These policies apply to all members of the University community (students, faculty, and staff) while they are on university property or engaged in any university activity.

Alcohol Policy:

The University expects that all members of the University community, and their guests, who choose to lawfully use or serve alcoholic beverages, will do so in a legal and responsible manner. In general, all Oregon State laws regarding the possession, sale and use of alcoholic liquors have been adopted by the University of Portland and will be enforced as applicable to the University of Portland campus. The following is a summary of those laws:

No person under the age of 21 years shall be in possession of, or attempt to purchase or acquire, any alcoholic beverage.

Entry into a licensed premise by a person under 21 years of age is prohibited.

At no time will a person be in possession of an open container in any public place or in any motor vehicle.

No one, other than a parent or guardian, shall sell, give or otherwise make available any alcoholic beverage to a person under the age of 21 years.

No person shall sell, give or otherwise make available any alcoholic beverage to a person who is intoxicated.

Except for persons holding the appropriate state licenses, no one shall sell, either directly or indirectly, alcoholic beverages.

Drug Policy:

The manufacture, sale, distribution, possession, or use of a controlled substance or drug, not medically authorized, is strictly prohibited by the University of Portland.
